Shepherd's Spring Trip— Great Experience!

What a great experience we all had together—and a lot of fun—at Shepherd's Spring! Our trip was the follow-up to our Missions/Sunday School Lenten project in which we collected over \$1,200 for Heifer International.

Shepherd's Spring is 220 acres of fields, gardens, woods and facilities in Sharpsburg, Maryland about three hours from Trafford, 10 minutes from Antietam Battlefield and a half hour from Harper's Ferry.

Shepherd's Spring Heifer Global Village is complete with international homes, gardens and animals that represent several of the countries in which Heifer International works to improve people's sources of nutrition and income through the gift of livestock and training. The Village is one method that Heifer uses to raise awareness of hunger and poverty.

Our group—Les and Donna Race; Bill and Stephanie Jones; Beverly Piper; Rachel Bash; Christian Boehm; Kayla Eiseman; Bob and Jude Lovre; and Stephanie, Elijah and Jonathan Judy—arrived at 11:30 AM on Saturday, June 14. We began our Cultural Connections program by cooking our own lunch; foods commonly eaten

in Guatemala—the country we chose "visit." We to cooked from scratch: tortillas, salsa (avocado, mango, tomato, garlic and pepper), huevos rancheros refried (eggs), beans. fried bananas and vogurt/nut sauce. Delicious! We listened to Guatemalan folk music while preparing lunch.


Following lunch, our guide Stewart,



shared a Mayan folk story with us as well as a lot of information about the people, customs, food, homes and religion of the country.

We visited a Guatemalan home, typically made of clay brick and wood. It had two rooms—one for cooking (woodstove) and one for the sleeping and living room area. Hammocks and mats are rolled up during the day to make "living room." In hot weather, they can be moved outside to enjoy a cool breeze.

Then we enjoyed sawdust making paintings. They mix sawdust with paint colored with naturally occurring materials (this makes the paint go further). We made small paintings but the Guatemalan people paint large sections of cloth and put them on




the ground to walk on during festivals. We saw some beautiful clothing, musical instruments and a cross made in Guatemala.



Next we were given a walking tour of the Global Village and saw homes in Kenya, Mozambique, Thailand, Appalachia (in the USA) and a refugee tent. At the end of our tour we all got to meet the resident chickens, goats and alpacas (a big hit!).

We met a really big rabbit earlier in the tour and saw ducks too. This was the end of our excellent four hour tour.

The kids played some four-square and basketball before we had dinner in the Lodge Dining Hall. After dinner we enjoyed a relaxing evening of tree-



climbing, chase games in the field, sitting on a bench and swing and laying in the grass. That evening we had a campfire in the Pavilion in the woods.

We slept that night in rustic and comfortable cabins deep in the woods in The Poplar Village. Sunday morning after breakfast in the Dining Hall we had a worship service in the outdoor Pavilion in the woods (which was also attended by some zealous mosquitoes). We sang and we lifted praise to God. We thanked God for such a great experience and prayed for Shepherd's Spring's summer camping program—praying that more young people would come to know Jesus as their Savior.

We are thankful for the opportunity we had to go to Shepherd's Spring. We are thankful for what we have and are glad our homes do not have dirt floors and bamboo walls. We see so clearly how God has blessed us and our responsibility to share our gifts to bless others, help them, give them hope in Jesus' name.

Guatemala and Heifer International

Guatemala, from the Nahuatl name "Cuauhtemallan," which means "Territory with Many Trees," is where the Mayan people flourished. With outstanding accomplishments in painting, sculpture and engineering, Guatemala has a rich cultural heritage. From 1524 until 1821, Guatemala was under Spanish domain which caused a cultural and political breakdown. In the second half of the 20th century, the country went through a 36-year civil war, ending with a peace agreement in 1996. Present-day Guatemala is a country of extreme poverty and complex problems in human rights and economic and social development.

Heifer International's history in Guatemala began in 1970 by providing small livestock to families in remote rural areas that were affected by the 36 years of civil war. The program's approach is to work with impoverished rural communities and ethnic groups to improve their livelihoods. Guatemala's projects work toward the recovery of traditional and sustainable agricultural knowledge (ancestral farming), using native seeds and livestock. They promote the strengthening of local organizations in management and marketing.


OCC PACKING PARTY

OCC or Operation Christmas Child is a program run by Samaritan's Purse. The program focuses on providing shoeboxes filled with small gifts (toys, hygiene products, etc.) to children living in poverty around the world.

This year, churches within the Penn-Trafford school district (and PT Ministerium) are working together to collect items and pack shoeboxes, and collect funds to ship the packaged gifts.

Trafford Trinity is collecting funds to mail the shoeboxes (it costs \$7.00 to ship one box). We are also looking for volunteers to help pack the boxes. The Packing Party will take place on Saturday, August 2 from 9:00 AM until noon at Geiger's Plumbing Warehouse.
