A Ministry of Open Hearts

Dear Loved Ones,

Several years ago the United Methodist Church had an advertising campaign that included the slogan "Open hearts. Open minds. Open doors." This was to show that the United Methodist people are happy to embrace others into their presence, their thoughts and their very lives.

Each of these phrases poses a challenge to the person who is trying to

live in fulfillment of them. To open one's door allows anyone into your place of safety. Closed doors keep people out. Open doors let people in. An open door bars no one. In proclaiming an open door the United Methodist Church is saying two things: You are welcome here. United Methodists are not cut off from the world, but connected to it through the openness of our doors.

Opening our minds is a way to promote dialogue with individuals we encounter due to our open door, whether inside the building or outside. By encouraging this dialogue we invite others to share with us their lives, their hopes, fears, angers and needs. In doing this we make ourselves even more vulnerable. Now, not only are we allowing people into our home, but we are giving them room to express themselves in ways that come natural to them. This is a scary proposition because we are unsure of what we will get.

We give others space in our building, our home. We give them opportunity to make themselves comfortable in our space by inviting them to share with us who they really are. Now we take the final step through the love and example set forth by Jesus. We give ourselves. Open hearts is the ultimate in vulnerability. We now invite them into our lives. Through opening our hearts we commit ourselves to spend energy and resources and our experiences on another. When we open our hearts we take great risk in getting taken advantage of or getting hurt. But it still does not equal the risk and consequence of when God opened his heart to us through Jesus.

The slogan poses a challenge. Are we willing to put our hearts on the line in the love of Jesus? There is risk involved when we serve Christ. But that risk is offset by being in the arms of a God who is always with us.

What are some ways we can risk ourselves this year in the name and love of the one who first loved the world?

When you read the *Tempo* or the newspaper, ask the Lord, "How do you want me to open my heart so others may see your Son?"

Super Kids for Jesus

Super Kids for Jesus jogged right along in June! Our theme for the summer is feet and our theme verse is Romans 10:15b. "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news." What is the Good News? Jesus is risen. He's our Savior. He loves us and that's the very good news! And we had no idea our feet were beautiful. If you were in the morning worship service the first Sunday in June, you may have seen our "footnotes!" We wrote Romans 10:15b on the bottoms of our feet and presented the verse to the congregation.

So far we have met in the grassy lot across from the church and on the front porch of Trinity House. Maybe you've seen our hot pink banner! It's cool to be talking about Jesus when people walk by. We even have a theme song!

We've had our feet in mud! We've heard how Peter and John healed the lame man (Acts 3) and pulled him to his feet by the power of Jesus! We've heard how Jesus healed the ten lepers (Luke 17) and only one came back to say thank you. He threw himself at Jesus' feet and praised Him in a loud voice—no holding back the joy for this miracle.



There's more to come! We'll be painting and filming, and we're having a Beautiful Feet Contest! (Would you like to enter?) We are learning: we can study the Word of God, we can teach others and we can tell others about Jesus. Are there kids in your neighborhood that you can bring to Super Kids for Jesus?

Our mission project for the summer is to participate in Fill a Duffle program. We will collect donations to purchase as many pairs of "The Shoe That Grows" that we can at \$15 a pair.

A duffle holds 50 pairs of shoes. We will contribute as many as we can for our chosen organization, Hope Endeavors. This group operates Hope Village Children's Home in Malawi. Hope Village is an HIV/AIDS orphan care center. There, children affected by AIDS receive 24-hour care, food, clean water, shoes and HIV/AIDS medications as well as emotional and spiritual care.

The Shoe That Grows

The Shoe that Grows started when founder and executive director Kenton Lee was living and working in Nairobi, Kenya. He observed a little girl in a white dress wearing shoes way too small for her feet. That led to questions about why and finally the idea for a shoe that could adjust and expand.

More than two billion people in the world suffer from soil-transmitted parasites and diseases. The Shoe That Grows protects children's feet better than ill-fitting shoes or no shoes at all.

The shoe is a patented, innovative design and comes in two sizes: small and large. Each shoe grows five sizes and lasts at least five years. It is made with leather, compressed rubber and snaps. The shoe is easy to clean and to use.

It even travels well! It compresses into itself so that 50 pairs of the small size will fit into a duffle bag.

The Shoe That Grows is a project of Because International, a 501(c)3 organization head-quartered in Nampa, ID.
