Memorial Day reminds us that freedom is not cheap.

No longer are we slaves to the law that has condemned us. But through Jesus who took our punishment, we have been forgiven out of his love. This freedom has come at a great cost. Jesus suffered and died on our behalf.

# We Pray for...

Nicaragua is the largest of the Central American republics. In the 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> centuries it was colonized by both the Spanish and the British. Its population is made up mostly of Mestizos—people of mixed European and Indian ancestry.

Present-day Nicaragua is still recovering from its legacy of dictatorship and civil war. You may recall the Contra War and the Sandinistas, guerilla warfare, atrocities and human rights abuses of the 1980s and 1990s. The country was severely damaged in 1998 by Hurricane Mitch, which killed more than 1,800 Nicaraguans and destroyed several villages. Nicaragua has been home to many prominent artists, writers, and intellectuals, and it began to attract a significant income from tourism in the early 21st century.

The Evangelical Methodist Church in Nicaragua (IGLEMEN) was born in 1994. It blossomed in 2000 when the church began emphasizing evangelism and Pentecostal renewal. UMC Global Ministries partners with the British Methodist Church to train Nicaraguan pastors

in Wesleyan Theology to ensure that each of the existing congregations has a Methodist-trained pastor. IGLEMEN participates with the Churches of Christ in Nicaragua (Iglesias de Cristo de Nicaragua) to promote church growth and development in impoverished communities.


UMC Global Ministries also supports the church's ministry to women, children and impoverished communities. High priority areas are community health and development, a woman's clinic, and the building of wells, latrines and greenhouses to provide clean water and improve sanitation in the region.

Between ten and 14 Volunteers-in-Mission teams visit Nicaragua annually to work with local congregations throughout the country as part of the Western PA UMC Nicaraguan Partnership. And here is a personal touch to add to what is sometimes impersonal information...

At Annual Conference in Grove City just a few weeks ago, we were introduced to Rev. Ruben Zeledon and his wife Maryuris from Nicaragua. Rev. Zeledon is the new President Pastor of the Evangelical Methodist Church of Nicaragua.

With tears in his eves Rev. Zeledon expressed his hope for the future of the Church community in Nicaragua, and he thanked Western PA for providing relief during crisis. He said, "A man is greater on his knees than standing up."
