Paragraph 162 and 162a of The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church, 2016.

The rights and privileges a society bestows upon or withholds from those who comprise it indicate the relative esteem in which that society holds particular persons and groups of persons. We affirm all persons as equally valuable in the sight of God. We therefore work toward societies in which each person's value is recognized, maintained, and strengthened. We support the basic rights of all persons to equal access to housing, education, communication, employment, medical care, legal redress for grievances, and physical protection. We deplore

acts of hate or violence against groups or persons based on race, color, national origin, ethnicity, age, gender, disability, status, economic condition, sexual orientation, gender identity, or religious affiliation. Our respect for the inherent dignity of all persons leads us to call for the recognition, protection and implementation of the principles of The Universal Declaration of Human Rights so that communities and individuals may claim and enjoy their universal, indivisible, and inalienable rights.

We Pray for...

A new school year began recently for children across the United States, so it seems fitting to write about UMCOR's efforts to strengthen education for people, especially children, like those of South Sudan.

This young country gained independence from Sudan in July 2011 after decades of civil war. It is a diverse country consisting of ten states and having more than 60 major ethnic groups.

Its fertile soils and abundant water supplies make it one of the richest agricultural areas in Africa. South Sudan is also rich in oil reserves. Despite these natural resources, South Sudan is one of the least developed countries in Africa and one of the poorest in the world. More than two thirds of the population is illiterate; the rate is even higher for women.

Only six years old, South Sudan has experienced much turmoil; political infighting and border conflicts plague the young country. Disagreements with Sudan led to a shutdown in oil production in 2012, causing economic conditions to deteriorate. (Oil refineries and the pipeline to the Red Sea are in Sudan.)

UMCOR began working in Sudan in 2005 and opened an office in South Sudan in 2006 after the 2055 peace agreement which opened the

door for the secession vote in January 2011.

In Sudan and South Sudan, UMCOR has worked to improve education, particularly of girls, by building classrooms and school latrines, and by providing a system to collect and store fresh water. Through its Education and Child Protection program, UMCOR offers training for teachers and helps establish parent-teacher associations. It provides classroom equipment, furnishings, and school supplies. (Who knows, perhaps some of the school kits we assembled last year went to young boys and girls in South Sudan!)

Community engagement programs help explain the importance of educating the female population. UMCOR implemented a program to improve enrollment and retention of girls and to monitor teacher and student attendance daily. The organization also supplies grants to assist families in the purchase of uniforms, books, feminine hygiene products and other necessary supplies.

So during the month of September, please pray for the people of South Sudan and for UMCOR as the organization strives to improve education in the young country.

Rights of Racial and Ethnic Persons

Racism is the combination of power to dominate by one race over other races and a value system that assumes that the dominant race is innatelv superior to the others. Racism includes both personal and institutional racism. Personal racism is manifested through the individual expressions. attitudes, and/or behaviors that accept the assumptions of a racist value system and that maintain the benefits of this

system. Institutional racism is the established social pattern that supports implicitly or explicitly the racist value system. Racism, manifested as sin, plagues and hinders our relationship with Christ, inasmuch as it is antithetical to the gospel itself. In many cultures white persons are granted unearned privileges and benefits that are denied to persons of color. We oppose the creation of a racial hierarchy in any culture. Racism breeds racial discrimination. We define racial discrimination as the disparate treatment and lack of full access and equity in resources, opportunities, and participation in the Church and in society based on race or ethnicity.

Therefore, we recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons. We rejoice in the gifts that particular ethnic histories and cultures bring to our total life. We commit as the Church to move beyond symbolic expressions and representative models that do not challenge unjust systems of power and access.
